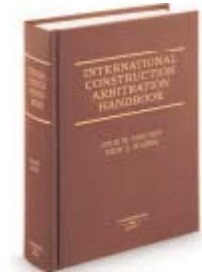


King & Spalding Lawyers Author Handbook on International Construction Arbitration
